CONGRESS RUBBER BRIDGE REPORT (Brad Johnston)

Brad and Sam Coutts represented Otago/Southland at this year's Rubber Bridge Competition.

The rubber bridge competition is one where you must play 30 boards (hand dealt) against your opponents with all players limited to a Junior limited system card and scores accumulated throughout the match in a series of rubbers (a rubber being equivalent to a two game match).

In the first match we played against Pam Whitehead and Stewart Grant (Top of the South), and they set the tone on board one when the auction went:

2S	Р	Р	(5D);

This went down 3 and we collected +500 when declarer didn't really have anything resembling a 5D bid.

We were able to control the pace of the match and gradually extended our lead over each of the rubbers to end up winning by about 2000 points.

In our second match we played against Wellington's Brian Cleaver and David May, and they got off to a sterling start by winning the first 3 rubbers (all of which were thankfully contested).

Rubber bridge is very much about "having the cards" and David had commented that he'd never held more opening hands in his life. We had a small rally around the middle of the match but never got within 1000 points of them. With 3 boards to go we were behind enough that to have a chance we needed to bid and make something like two games and a slam in those three hands.

Things did not look promising when I picked up my hand and saw the inspiring collection of:

x xxx JTxx Q98xx

But to allay my concerns, Sam opened the auction with a strong 2C bid, rebidding 2NT to show 22-23 balanced.

Did we still have a chance?

I had to decide if this was just a game hand (and raise to 3NT), or if this was the slam hand and look for a minor suit fit.

At the table I chose to just bid 3NT; which this time proved to be the sub optimal choice....if I had bid 3S (minor suit Stayman), Sam's reply would have been 4D and 6D did not present too many challenges.

Sam got the play problem right in 3NT, and as luck would have it the final two boards both produced games for us, but with the slam missed so was our last opportunity.

David and Brian carried on to win the finals of the rubber, playing against Top of the South's second qualifier Jim Jessup and Morris Carter (who'd qualified for the finals by a mere 40 points over Auckland/Northland's Kinga Hajmasi and Andrew Michl).

Even though it was a bit disappointing to not do any better, it was still a very entertaining event to play in - the scoring format is just different enough from standard duplicate bridge that there are lots of interesting or novel positions.

Here's hoping we do better next year though!

TEACHING COMMENT:

This week we thank Dean Eidler for his contribution on "Ruff 'n' Sluff' as a card play technique available to declarer.

A "**Ruff 'n' Sluff**" occurs when declarer can put one of the defenders on lead who has no choice but to then lead a suit that both declarer and dummy are void in. This allows declarer to "**ruff**" in one hand and "**sluff**" (ie discard a loser) in the other.

Here is a contrived example, with spades as trumps, and declarer South on lead:

If Declarer plays the last trump, there are two losers;


If Declarer plays a Diamond. West must win and can only return a diamond. On that second diamond declarer can trump in one hand and throw away a heart in the other, then win the last trick with the remaining trump.

If Declarer plays a heart, good

defence will win AH & AD; but

The key plays by declarer are to eliminate the side suits and then "throw an opponent in".

Dean has highlighted this play technique as it was critical in two contracts in last Monday's teams competition.



Against 4♠ by North, East led the 7H.

Declarer won this with this Ace, ruffed a heart, played a trump to dummy and ruffed another heart.

Declarer then played a second trump and 3 rounds of diamonds, leaving both Declarer and Dummy now both void in the red suit

Next Declarer played AC and another club won by East with KC. East is now on lead in this position

Against 3♠ by North, East led AC, KC, KD. Declarer won AD and played trumps.


East won the first one, cashed QD and continued a diamond.

Declarer won the Jack, pulled the last trump and played Ace and another heart. Poor East!

With only clubs left they were forced to give a Ruff 'n' Sluff





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
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CAN'T SEE THE MENACE FOR THE SQUEEZE! – Brad Johnston

The following board amused me when I played it during the O/S Congress Pairs last weekend. Sitting East, I helped perpetrate the following auction:



Opposite the KC I was all set to bid 7NT (it was matchpoints, after all), but now it looked like I had a potential club loser and a potential diamond loser on the deal, so trying for all the tricks seemed a bit optimistic.

Chris lead the KD pretty speedily and I had to plan how to play the deal. It's a matter of good technique to count your winners and losers when you first see dummy: This'll let you know how much work you have "left to go" in the hand. Here you have 2 spade tricks, 7 heart tricks, 1 diamond trick and 1 club trick. That adds up to 11 tricks, so you must find a way to make (at least) one more trick in order to succeed in your contract.

What about losers? The KD lead will knock out your ace, and then the opponents will have the QD as a winner, but they have no other immediate tricks.

- Given the 1S overcall, it seemed pretty likely that Chris held both spade honours, but if I lead one towards the AT he could insert the Q or J and I wouldn't be able to finesse the 10S for a Diamond discard.
- If Arleen held the KC as North, I'd be able to succeed by playing a C towards the AQ in my hand but if this failed the defence would be able to cash the QD for -1.
- Given the confidence with which the KD was led (and the 1S overcall), I judged that the KC rated to be offside and that the finesse was unlikely to work.
- I judged that neither finesse was going to bring me to 12 tricks, so I had to find another idea.

A common concept on hands like this is to play the hand on a squeeze.

This is when you force the opponents to discard a lot of cards as you run your winners, and you hope that they run out of losers to throw and have to discard a winner too.

See the dilemma South faces if we get to the position shown below:

You can see that South has to keep all three spades to stop the AT7 being winners and they also have to keep both of their clubs to stop the AQ of clubs being winners.

The only issue with this is that on the lead of the 5H they need to discard a card in one of these suits – and whichever one they discard in will give me my 12th trick. My long cards in each of these suits (the QC and the TS) are what we call *'menaces'* in squeeze parlance.

An important concept in squeezes is called 'rectifying the count'.

Your goal is that when you play the squeeze card (here the 5H), that the opponent(s) you're squeezing don't have any losers they can safely throw away.

• If South still had a diamond available for this trick, they could safely discard their D and not have to compromise their holding in either black suit.

Typically, this means that declarer should aim to lose all the tricks they can afford to early on in the play before attempting to carry out their squeeze line.

As such, I ducked the KD at trick 1 and won the low diamond continuation. I was then able to peel off 7 rounds of trumps and watch Chris start to squirm over his discards.

At the table Chris discarded down to the singleton KC (which is good practice – if you think you're getting squeezed, you should guard the suit that only you can guard – here South has the only Spade guard & he can hope Arleen can protect clubs).

After entering 6H= in the bridge pad, I was patting myself on the back and Chris offered a 'well played' for my line. It was only after the session when I was looking at the hand record that I saw that 7H (and indeed – 7NT) was cold on the layout. What went wrong...?

When South lead the KD at trick 1, I was focused on the location of the KC & the QJ of spades. I hadn't stopped to consider the diamond position.

• The KD lead marks South with the QD, and I held the JD in dummy (and the TD in hand, to add insult to injury!)

As such, I could have actually won the KD with the Ace at trick 1 and then played 7 rounds of trumps to reach the position shown below.

On the last trump, South needs to find a discard from QJ9 of spades and the KJ of clubs (just like before) – except this time Chris also has the QD in his possession.

If the QD was a low D (if Arleen had the QD), then Chris could pitch his useless diamond and not be under any pressure – but because he held the sole threat in all three suits he would actually be squeezed in three suits on this trick (a triple squeeze).

I imagine that a lot of people imagine these squeeze plays as the mark of an expert bridge player, but remember that all I did on this deal was 'win and run my winners' – surely that's not too hard of a task to accomplish?

Sadly, on the day, there was no justice for my poor line – no other pairs reached slam on the E/W cards. Even though two declarers managed to win all 13 tricks (so well done to Michael Johnstone [QS lead] and especially John Sheehy [KD lead]).

The reason that I was so amused by this board after the fact was that I had a blind spot in the diamond suit and was focusing on all the wrong things.

Bridge is a hard game, and people do make mistakes

- the important thing is being able to take them in stride and make the most of whatever situations you end up in because of them.

When you sit down to play bridge you're not always going to be able to see the forest for the trees.
